Public update for the week of January 14, 2021.

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Emergency status: A state of emergency was declared on March 27, 2020.

Health care

- Some Yukoners can now book their vaccination appointment on www.Yukon.ca/this-is-our-shot or by calling 1-877-374-0425, including residents of:
 - Watson Lake
 - Beaver Creek
 - Old Crow; and
 - Whitehorse who are:
 - high risk health-care workers who may care for or be in contact with COVID-19 patients;
 - older adults (starting with 70 years and older); or
 - people who are marginalized and living in group settings, such as the Whitehorse Emergency Shelter and Whitehorse Correctional Centre.
- The CMOH Dr. Brendan Hanley confirmed that a possible case linked to multiple contacts over the past week has tested negative for COVID-19.

- Yukoners are reminded to stay home and get tested if they have symptoms, however mild. Testing hours are:
 - 8:30 a.m. to 6 p.m., Monday through Sunday at the COVID-19 Testing and Assessment Centre; or
 - 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday at the Drive-thru COVID-19 testing centre.
- It is mandatory to wear a non-medical mask in all indoor public spaces.

Travel and borders

- Canada and the US have continued to extend the border closures to non-essential travel until February 21, 2021.
- If you choose to go past the Canadian border station at Fraser or Beaver Creek, you may be subject to a 14-day federal quarantine.
- Everyone entering Yukon is required to self-isolate for 14 days. Exceptions include critical services workers that have left the territory to perform their work duties and residents of border areas such as Atlin, Lower Post, Fire Side, Jade City, Fraser, Good Hope Lake and Pleasant Camp. Critical service workers must fully self-isolate except for when they are performing their duties.
